### 3: PROJECT ID – 4-J2ZY6N1 Additional funding for Larrakia Nation Community Night Patrol

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#### 1. Project description

- 1.1 The Provider must deliver the following Project, as per the same conditions set out in the existing executed Project Schedule 4-G3Z9CIA - Community Night Patrol ending 30/06/2024

#### Project description

- 1.2 The Provider must use the Grant to operate community Night Patrols (the Project) in Darwin, Palmerston, Belyuen, Batchelor, Acacia Larrakia and Amangal (the communities) from 1 December 2023 to 30 June 2026
- 1.3 The Provider must deliver the Project to improve levels of community safety and promote culturally appropriate conflict and dispute resolution in line with the communities' safety priorities (refer to Bagot Community Safety Plan). The Provider must ensure the Night Patrols use non-coercive intervention strategies to respond flexibly to the communities' safety needs and priorities.
- 1.4 The Provider must ensure the Night Patrols:
- assist vulnerable people at risk of causing or becoming victims of harm by transporting them to a safe place where their immediate needs can be addressed;
  - refer vulnerable people to other services for ongoing assistance such as community health centres or clinics, police, alcohol and other drug services and any other services in the community;
  - ensure children are at home or in another safe location with a parent or carer by 9pm at night;
  - divert intoxicated people away from contact with the criminal justice system, prior to any crime being committed;
  - assist in the recording and reporting of incidents and assistance provided;
  - provide advice, information and/or assistance that may reduce risk to individuals;
  - work in partnership with the local police and Shire/Community Council through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), Community Safety Plan or other local agreement arrangements;
  - promote and raise awareness of the Community Night Patrol project in the communities; and
  - support Night Patrollers to participate in training as appropriate to their job roles.
- 1.5 The Provider must ensure early intervention strategies are used to prevent disorder in communities and when appropriate the Night Patrols are to seek assistance from the Larrakia Nation key Leaders with mediating and resolving community safety issues.
- 1.6 The Provider must ensure the communities are informed and are aware of the out-of-scope activities of Night Patrol:

- providing a taxi service for community members;
  - providing a security service for protection or monitoring assets in the community;
  - providing a service outside of community Night Patrol scope, such as ambulance or fire service, or transporting people to court;
  - providing a service that is the responsibility of the police;
  - transporting children to school;
  - alcohol support services; and
  - using Night Patrol vehicles during or outside of work time to participate in ceremonial business or hunting.
- 1.7 The Provider must ensure community members, child and family services, health and community services, mainstream and Indigenous organisations in the communities have a clear understanding of the services available through the Night Patrols, and a clear understanding of the roles and responsibilities of Night Patrollers.
- 1.8 The Provider must establish and maintain, through formal pathways or Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs), linkages and referral processes with other providers including but not limited to the local police, alcohol and other drugs services, youth diversion services, health clinics, child and family services, sport and recreation services and legal services. The Provider must provide a copy of the MOUs or agreements for these partnerships to National Indigenous Australian Agency as they are developed or reviewed.
- 1.9 The Provider must develop an MOU with the Northern Territory Police for the Night Patrols. The MOU must outline the high level principles and overarching working arrangements governing the relationship between the police and Night Patrols in each community, and is to provide a framework for driving collaboration at the local level. Specific working arrangements of the Night Patrollers and the police are to be developed through consultations with the communities and be incorporated in the MOU and local Community Safety Action Plans (CAPS). The Provider must provide the Agency with a copy of the MOU and copies of the CAPS as they are developed and reviewed.
- 1.10 The Provider must ensure the Night Patrols operate at times when they are most needed by the communities. As a minimum, the Provider must operate Night Patrols within the hours of 12pm to 2am, at least five (5) days per week. There must be at least two (2) Patrollers and a designated Team Leader on duty for each Night Patrol.
- 1.11 The Provider must take reasonable measures to ensure that all Night Patrol positions are filled throughout the Project period ensuring there are staff available for the delivery of the service, including administration, financial management, human resource management and leadership. Every reasonable measure must be taken to ensure recruitment of as many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff for the Project, taking into account the total staffing required and qualifications

specific to the Night Patrol services. Descriptions for each position including qualifications, hours, salaries and roles must be provided to the Agency. The Agency must agree to any changes prior to the development or review of the staffing profiles and structure. The Provider must ensure appropriate staffing levels at all times, particularly in regards to maintaining service delivery and the mandated service hours in the communities. If positions become vacant, or are unable to be filled, the Provider must notify the Agency immediately and implement risk mitigation strategies.

- 1.12 The Provider must ensure each staff member employed in the community Night Patrol services:
- Maintains client privacy and confidentiality at all times; and
  - Adheres to the Provider's organisation's Code of Conduct
- 1.13 The Provider must ensure the funding for the Project is used for:
- Employing a minimum of 16 local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Night Patrollers;
  - Employing one (1) FTE Community Night Patrol Program Manager;
  - Employing one (1) FTE Community Night Patrol Coordinator who is based in Darwin;
  - Information and communication technology to support administration and management of the Project;
  - Providing well equipped office space in the three communities including computers and Information technology services for the Program Manager, Coordinator and Night Patrollers;
  - Maintenance and repairs of the Night Patrol vehicles; and
  - Training, mentoring and counselling for the Night Patrollers, Program Manager and Coordinator.
- 1.14 The Provider must ensure the Night Patrollers, Coordinator and Program Manager are offered flexible working arrangements including full time and part-time employment and are paid according the conditions in the relevant Industry Award. The Night Patrollers must also be offered the opportunity to acquire a driver's licence.
- 1.15 The Provider must create and maintain training and employment opportunities for at least 80 per cent of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff employed in the Night Patrols. The Provider must ensure all staff have documented evidence of their experience working with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Any non-Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff employed should have undertaken, or do so as part of initial training, cultural competency training, or be able to provide documented evidence of their experience working with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
- 1.16 The Provider must ensure that the delivery of Night Patrol are culturally appropriate and local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are employed to deliver the Project. All staff employed to deliver the Night Patrol services must understand the role of the Night Patroller and be able to respond to safety needs and priorities in their communities.

- 1.17 The Provider must provide induction training for all staff as appropriate to their job roles and ensure Night Patrollers are given the opportunity to enrol, progress and attain a Certificate III in Community Night Patrol and other relevant qualifications relating to working in a Night Patrol service including how to deal with violence, alcohol and drug related issues, personal safety and the law.
- 1.18 The Provider must ensure the Night Patrollers, Team Leaders, Coordinator and Program Manager have the appropriate skills to:
- deliver an effective Night Patrol service;
  - provide a safe and culturally sensitive service for each community including identified 'hot spots' for monitoring the safety of children, women and other vulnerable people;
  - develop partnerships and referral processes with service providers that are involved in supporting victims of harm including alcohol and other drug services, health clinics, youth diversion , safe houses, child and family services, counselling services, cultural mediation and rehabilitation programs; and
  - provide public awareness about Night Patrol to promote its benefits through appropriate communication strategies.
- 1.19 The Provider must ensure that the Night Patrols regularly engage in activities in consultation with the communities, service providers and the Agency; for example, White Ribbon Day, National Families Week and other organised community events and celebrations.
- 1.20 The Provider must deliver the Night Patrols in accordance with the 'Community Night Patrols Operational Framework 2017' (or as amended from time to time) issued by the Agency.
- 1.21 The Provider is required to provide a range of output and outcome information as part of the bi-annual performance reporting requirements, including, but not limited to:
- a. number of staff employed, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff;
  - b. details of training completed by all staff;
  - c. number of clients assisted;
  - d. number of referrals provided by service provider, and
  - e. number and type of safety incidents dealt with by patrollers.
- 1.22 The Provider must ensure that the Program Manager, Coordinator and Night Patrollers understand and comply with mandatory reporting of domestic and family violence under the *Domestic and Family Violence Act 2007 (NT)* and mandatory reporting of child abuse under the *Care and Protection of Children Act 2007 (NT)*

- 1.23 The Provider must ensure the Night Patrollers are offered and have access to culturally appropriate counselling to reduce the impacts of vicarious trauma from ongoing exposure to community safety issues and threats to their personal safety.
- 1.24 The Provider must ensure staff working in alcohol and other drugs services work alongside the Night Patrollers to assist, monitor and support residents under the influence of alcohol or drugs and to divert vulnerable people from contact with the criminal justice system including referring them to specialised rehabilitation services for treatment.
- 1.25 The Project must increase the involvement of the communities including residents and service providers in the ownership and operations of the Night Patrols by:
- working with the communities to co-design the Night Patrol service model which is to be reviewed six monthly to ensure:
    - a) Communities have 'a say' in the way the Night Patrols are delivered;
    - b) Night Patrols are targeted and tailored to meet safety needs and priorities;
    - c) Safety needs and priorities are being addressed and met; and
    - d) The objectives of the Community Night Patrol programme are being achieved;
  - Reporting progress and challenges about safety needs and priorities to each community safety committee, at Bagot community safety meetings and other community meetings; for example, Local Authority Meetings;
  - Sharing information and working collaboratively on issues that impact on and affect the safety of the communities;
  - Implementing key deliverables in the community safety action plans;
  - Incorporating evidence based approaches to setting Night Patrol priorities;
  - Working with the communities to develop a six monthly Activity Work Plan to promote the Night Patrol services which includes a key focus on how to access Night Patrol and promoting the benefits of it. A copy of the Activity Plan is to be provided to the Agency in February and August of each year of the Project; and
  - Undertaking annual evaluations of the Night Patrol services in October of each year of the Project to identify 'what is working' and 'what needs improving'.
- 1.26 The Provider must undertake regular community consultations to determine the communities' safety needs and priorities. To undertake this work, the Provider must facilitate and/or attend all community safety stakeholder meetings in each of the communities, complete relevant actions and provide written progress reports to stakeholders outlining completed and outstanding actions including strategies to address identified safety issues. The Provider must provide the Agency with copies of written progress reports within ten (10) working days of the meetings and consultations. The Agency will work with the Provider and the communities to review current investment and to develop activities tailored to better meet regional priorities and community needs.

- 1.27 The Provider must allow the Agency funding agreement contract manager access to the Night Patrol services as part of the Agency performance monitoring process to ensure the Night Patrol outcomes are being achieved, and the Project is delivered according to the funding agreement and the Community Night Patrol Operational Framework.
- 1.28 The Provider must submit to the Agency detailed budget for the operations of the Project from 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2024 within 10 days of the execution of the funding agreement. The grant funding must be used in accordance with the approved budget and agreed by the Agency.
- 1.29 The Provider must provide the Agency (where applicable) with a copy of the annual budgets for each Night Patrol on or before 1 July of each year of the Project. The grant funding must be used in accordance with the approved budget and agreed to by the Agency.
- 1.30 The Provider must include the following income and expenses in the Budget:
- grant funding;
  - salaries and other employee costs;
  - motor vehicle running costs, repairs and maintenance;
  - training;
  - travel and accommodation; and
  - other operational costs.
- 1.31 The Provider must declare Activity Generated Income earned as a result of the grant funding under this Project Schedule such as, but is not limited to, bank interest, proceeds from sale of assets, victims of crime legal costs, insurance payments and Medicare reimbursements. All Activity Generated Income is to be included as part of the Grant income for the Project and must be reported accordingly within the financial statements as part of the annual funding acquittal documentation.
- 1.32 The Provider must undertake six monthly risk assessments of the Night Patrols in March and September of each year of the Project. Where issues are identified, the Provider must develop risk mitigation strategies to address them. The Provider must advise the Agency of any emerging issues for the Project and broader issues relating to the Night Patrols as soon as they are identified. The Agency may at any time undertake a risk assessment of the Provider and the Project.
- 1.33 The provider must comply with the requirements of the Head Agreement by ensuring that each staff member holds Working with Vulnerable Persons and police and criminal history checks, as per the requirements in the Northern Territory, where employed in relation to a project where there are children or vulnerable persons. The provider must provide evidence that it has complied with the requirements of the Head Agreement to the Commonwealth each year for the duration of the Project.

- 1.34 The Provider must work in collaboration with the communities and the Agency to ensure best practice principles and continuous improvement underpins service delivery to achieve the objectives of the Project. DASA delivers the module to both male and female prisoners, and offers and facilitates referrals for clients to other services as needed on exit from the prison.
  - (b) Complement DASA's AOD outreach service and will contribute to better health and wellbeing outcomes for Indigenous prisoners incarcerated for six months or less.
  - (c) Complements the Department's current funding of DASA's Aboriginal Outreach serv
  - (d) Provide AOD treatment through a combination of therapeutic counselling and related AOD rehabilitation measures to include:
    - (i) assessment and intake procedures, follow-up and aftercare for clients who have exited from prison and require a referral to and/or have attended residential rehabilitation, and support for people accessing non-residential rehabilitation; and
    - (ii) A client centred approach, alcohol counselling , support and advocacy for prisoners to
    - (iii) develop skills needed to address AOD use.
  - (e) Provide social and cultural support and advocacy for prisoners to develop skills needed to address AOD abuse to include:
    - (i) Appropriate referrals to other internal/external related or professional support services as required, including referrals to Indigenous and/or mainstream services (including hospital,

- GPs) for detoxification support, referrals to residential facilities and/or non-residential rehabilitation programs; and
- (ii) Working collaboratively with other AOD services, hospitals and Indigenous and non-Indigenous community, treatment and residential services to provide referral pathways based on client need, seamless service delivery and support to clients during inpatient and home based withdrawal, residential rehabilitation and return to community.
- 2.6 The project must deliver a culturally appropriate eight session module over four weeks at the Alice Springs Correctional Centre with:
- (a) at least 70 prisoners participating per financial year;
  - (b) Seven modules each financial year, with up to twelve participants per module;
  - (c) A minimum of two modules delivered to Indigenous female prisoners only; and
  - (d) Support referrals to other services for Indigenous prisoners on exit from prison.
- 2.7 The Provider must ensure all positions directly providing service to clients are filled by appropriately qualified workers, holding the following professional experience and qualifications or equivalent:
- (a) At a minimum, all AOD workers (client-based positions, particularly non-clinical roles) have completed or are working towards a Certificate IV in Alcohol and Other Drugs;
  - (b) Other qualifications as relevant including Cert III in Community Work or Clinical Counselling; and
  - (c) Clinical specialist staff, such as psychologists, must be fully qualified and accredited in their field.
- 2.8 The Provider must ensure that education and support/training is available to workers to enable provision of culturally competent AOD care.
- 2.9 The Provider must engage with the Workforce Development Support Unit provider(s) in their state/territory regarding training and workforce development supports, and to ensure sharing of information and resources regarding the current AOD workforce, including meeting any related reporting compliance requirements.
- 2.10 The Provider must create and maintain training and employment opportunities for all staff, ensuring that 100% of staff engaged to the project are Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
- (a) The Provider must have staff engage in the equivalent of 0.6 FTE for delivery of this Project.
  - (b) The Provider must take reasonable measures to ensure that all positions are filled throughout the Project period.
  - (c) The Provider must make every reasonable measure to ensure there are staff available to support the delivery of the service, including administration, finance, human resources, management and leadership.
  - (d) The Provider must aim to recruit/employ as many Indigenous staff as possible to the Project, taking into account total staffing required and qualifications specific to the Project
  - (e) The Provider must ensure appropriate staffing levels at all times, particularly in regards to maintaining service delivery and mandated service hours from service sites.
  - (f) Descriptions for each position including qualifications, hours, salaries and role description must be provided to the Agency.
  - (g) The Agency must agree prior to any changes to the agreed staffing profile and structure.

**Key Points:**

1. This brief seeks Group Manager, Social Policy approval for continued funding for 34 IAS activities from Programs 1.2 and 1.3 of \$50,759,103.40 (GST exclusive) from 1 July 2023, for up to two years for 31 existing activities, and up to three years in-principle commitment of funding for three existing activities located in the NPY Empowered Community region. All activities are due to cease on or before 30 June 2023. The majority of these activities are located in and around the Central Australian Region, however some are activities that are attached to the same funding agreement as the in scope geographic area and cannot be decoupled so have been included in this process. These activities would have ordinarily been considered as part of the upcoming 30 June 2023 grant assessment process.
2. This brief also seeks Group Manager, Closing the Gap, Connection and Culture, approval for continued funding for seven (7) IAS activities from Program 1.4 of \$4,800,966.00 (GST exclusive) from 1 July 2023, for up to two years for five existing activities and up to three years in-principle commitment of funding for two existing activities located in the NPY Empowered Community region. All activities are due to cease on or before 30 June 2023. The majority of these activities are located in and around the Central Australian Region, however some are activities that are attached to the same funding agreement as the in scope geographic area and cannot be decoupled so have been included in this process. These activities would have ordinarily been considered as part of the upcoming 30 June 2023 grant assessment process.
3. Group Managers are authorised to approve funding to this level as shown in [NIAA Decision Making Policy for Administered Funding \(Grants\) Operational Guidance](#).
4. On 24 January 2023, the Prime Minister, Minister Linda Burney, Senator Patrick Dodson, Senator Malarndirri McCarthy visited Alice Springs with the Northern Territory Chief Minister to hold a series of meetings about the escalating community safety and crime issues occurring in Alice Springs. As part of the visit the Prime Minister announced a suite of new measures to address the issues, including the development of medium and long term strategies which will be agreed in partnership between Commonwealth and Northern Territory agencies and in consultation with communities.
5. The Prime Minister announced \$25 million to extend funding for safety and community services which are currently scheduled to end in June 2023 to provide certainty to providers and their employees and ensure this work continues. The Prime Minister's statement provides the NIAA with the policy authority to undertake a grant funding process immediately for the relevant Alice Springs and regional IAS activities (Central Australia). Noting that the total recommended funding amount of \$55,560,069.40 for 41 activities differs from the Prime Minister's statement with the full scope of activities covering the Central Australian region (and a very small number in other locations but linked to in scope activities) included in this process. This includes both full geographic coverage and coverage of funded activities across safety and community services to maximise support to communities in Central Australia.
6. The Northern Territory Government has introduced immediate temporary restrictions on alcohol sales as a circuit-breaker to improve community safety in Central Australia. The Northern Territory and Australian Governments appointed a Central Australian Regional Controller and will lead consultation with communities including around the reintroduction of alcohol restrictions and an opt-out system for individual communities.
7. These actions along with the Prime Minister's announcement of \$48.8 million over two years in Alice Springs to tackle crime, keep women and children safe and provide support to young

people in communities, align with the NIAA's priorities in ensuring IAS funding to services in Central Australia, including Alice Springs, can support the region in a timely way.

8. The activities are grants as defined by the CGRGs because they will assist the organisations to provide services for the benefit of the communities. These activities deliver critical education, health, alcohol and other drugs, wellbeing, community safety and diversionary services for First Nations communities, children and youth living in and around Alice Springs.
9. There are currently five activities across Programs 1.3 and 1.4 in scope for this grant decision that fall within the NPY Empowered Communities (EC) region and are currently being considered through the Joint Decision Making (JDM) process. These activities are recommended for three year funding terms from 1 July 2023 for in-principle commitment of funding totalling \$3,760,776. However, the JDM process will continue and its recommendations will be put to the Delegate in March, at which point the final funding decision will be made by the Delegate, taking into account the recommendations arising from the JDM process. It is noted that the full JDM options will remain open to the JDM process and delegate, including ceasing the funding with the current provider and repurposing it within the bounds of the IAS. NIAA will ensure clear communication with the EC region and relevant service providers throughout.
10. As at 31 December 2022, Program 1.2 Children and Schooling has available budget of \$24.7 million, Program 1.3 has \$2.02 million and Program 1.4 has \$10.7 million over the four (4) year period to 2025-26. The detailed financial impact of the proposed activities is in the NIAA and Legislative Requirements at Attachment A.
11. These activities are across IAS Programs 1.2, 1.3 and 1.4 and have been assessed prior to other IAS activities being progressed through the June 2023 Grant Assessment Process, in direct response to the recent announcements from the Prime Minister in Alice Springs on 24 January 2023.
12. The activities and assessment details are at Attachments B1 and B2 and D, and have been endorsed by the relevant Regional Managers.

### ***1.2 – Children and Schooling***

13. There is one IAS funded activity due to cease on 30 June 2023 with a per annum value of \$124,139. This activity operates a transport and engagement service to ensure children are enrolled, or are likely to be enrolled in Alice Springs Preschools. This activity supports children living in Alice Springs Town Camps to attend pre-school regularly.

### ***1.3 – Safety and Wellbeing.***

14. The NIAA currently administers \$8.76 million per annum in funding to seven providers who currently deliver 10 Indigenous specific, culturally secure, trauma-informed and integrated alcohol and other drugs (AOD) treatment and related support services to reduce the harms from substance use for First Nations people in Central Australia. Services include a mixture of residential rehabilitation treatment and aftercare, and AOD outreach support services across the region with wrap around care through therapeutic individual, family and community supports. Activities support progress toward Closing the Gap (CtG) outcome areas 1 and 14.
15. Funding of \$10.15 million per annum is administered for 14 crime prevention activities, including community safety patrols, a prisoner through-care service, and diversion activities in Central Australia. These activities aim to reduce contact with the criminal justice system and support progress towards CtG outcome areas 10 and 11.

16. Funding of \$1.24 million per annum is being provided for three Youth Engagement (sport and recreation) activities that create opportunities for communities to engage in positive events or activities; bring young people together for positive, fun and accessible activities; facilitate opportunities for other service providers to engage with youth, and provide a diversion to anti-social and destructive behaviour. This will support progress towards CtG outcome areas 1 and 14.
17. Funding of \$3.16 million per annum is provided to five providers who deliver holistic, culturally safe person-centred care to strengthen First Nations people's social and emotional wellbeing in Central Australia. Their services include advocacy and case management, referrals, community outreach activities and healing activities that support strong, health and resilient individuals, families and communities. A further \$1.5 million per annum is provided to deliver targeted activities to reduce volatile substance use within the region. These support progress towards CtG outcome areas 1 and 14.

#### ***IAS Program 1.4 – Culture and Capability.***

18. Total funding of \$4.8 million will be provided to four providers over the next 3 years to deliver seven activities in the Central Australian region. Services include Indigenous Culture Program, Capability Projects and Indigenous Interpreting Services including those delivered within NPY Empowered Community. These activities support the expression, engagement and revitalisation of First Nation's cultures, and activities that strengthen the capability, governance and leadership of First Nation's peoples, organisations and communities. These support progress towards CtG outcome area 15.

#### ***Grant activity assessment***

19. Activities considered in-scope are intended to cover the Central Australian region in recognition of the regular movement of people in and out of Alice Springs and supporting the need for holistic and integrated service provision. This is to ensure access to critical services remains available and providers can continue operating in Central Australian region with funding certainty.
20. Additionally, if a provider is funded for activities located outside of the identified geographic area of Central Australia and are part of the same funding agreement as the in-scope geographic area, these activities are also the subject of this early funding decision.
21. Additional mitigation and program oversight will be applied to activities where risk issues relating to performance, governance or financials, including significant underspends where identified, will be managed through robust NIAA Grants Management Frameworks and standard risk controls.
22. All grant activities have been assessed under the new IAS Grant Opportunity Guidelines (agency collaborates – non-competitive). Further information as to whether each activity fully meets/partially meets or does not meet the assessment criteria is included in Attachments B1 and B2, with further information about assessment criteria at Attachment D.
23. Information on your obligations under the CGRGs, relevant legislation and NIAA requirements are set out in the NIAA and Legislative Requirements at Attachment A and must be considered before you approve a funding decision and sign this brief.

#### ***Media Release***

24. There is an opportunity for the Minister to announce the grant extensions in a media release. A handling strategy is currently being developed and will be distributed to relevant NIAA stakeholders (Central Group, ministers' offices and NIAA executive) to support external engagement in relation to the funding.

25. Note, it will be important to hold internal discussions to consider the timing of any announcement to ensure, in part, that key stakeholders including peaks in the Central Australian region are informed in a timely way about this grant decision and next steps.

## 1.2 Summary Information

<b>Brief Summary</b>	Your approval as Delegate is sought for indicative funding of up to \$23,188,598 (GST exclusive) from 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2026 for 78 IAS-funded alcohol and other drugs (AOD) activities. This funding is available under a separate Closing the Gap appropriation funding of up to \$66 million announced in August 2021 (including \$58.65 million in administered funds) over four years from 2021-22 to 2024-25. You also have the authority to approve \$618,129 in funding for the
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service delivery component for some of these AOD activities in 2025-26 as the Closing the Gap appropriation is an ongoing measure.

The Strengthening Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander AOD Treatment Services Initiative aims to improve First Nations clients' access to therapeutic, culturally safe services. In line with legal advice (refer Attach B) the funding is to be offered to eligible activities with current funding agreements through Deeds of Variation under the Agency Collaborates - GOGs.

Attach C explains about the few AOD activities deemed ineligible at this time. There are also a number of activities with high or extreme indicative risk levels. This is often due to the grant relating to a frontline service and its value being over \$1 million. Comments explaining risk mitigations for these activities are added to the Sensitivities field.

The Initiative will deliver an overdue funding boost for IAS-funded AOD activities in recognition of an effective ten-year freeze on additional funding. During this time the landscape of the sector shifted with best practice standards becoming more refined and increased expectations for services to meet clients' complex treatment needs.

This proposal for an initial rollout of Initiative funding is comprised of two components. The first is a per annum (p.a.), activity-based funding component to support existing service delivery to a total value of \$16,938,598. Funding amounts for activities have been calculated based on current base funding: those activities with \$333,334 p.a. or above will receive an increase of 15 per cent p.a. and those with less than \$333,334 p.a. receiving a flat rate of \$50,000 p.a. The majority of activities are funded for two years from 2023-24 to 2024-25.

The second component is a one-off, provider-based grant of \$100,000 (to a total value of \$6,250,000) to be made in 2023-24. This funding will support providers to address data capability needs, including strengthening providers' ability to report annually to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare's Alcohol and Other Drugs Treatment Services - National Minimum Data Set (AODTS-NMDS). Attach D provides Group Manager approval for this variation approach.

MS23-000019 (Attach A) provides Ministerial policy and funding authority to commit up to \$48 million (administered) in Initiative funds over two years (2023-24 and 2024-25) to address providers' service delivery, data and minor infrastructure needs. Ministerial approval was also received for approximately \$20 million p.a. additional and ongoing service delivery funding under the

	<p>Initiative through to 2031 (to align the Initiative funding to the term of the CTG Implementation Plan). It is expected that the service delivery funding boost will be embedded into existing base funding for eligible activities, pending the outcomes of upcoming Grant Assessment Processes.</p> <p>This proposal is consistent with findings from an extensive national AOD sector consultation process which concluded in June 2023. Strong views were expressed to prioritise a substantial portion of Initiative funding towards increasing funding for IAS-funded AOD providers. This was to assist with addressing the lack of funding increases and enable continued improvement of services and strengthened data capabilities.</p> <p>The sector also advocated for funding to address providers' minor infrastructure needs. A separate Funding Brief will be developed for your approval once an implementation pathway is agreed.</p>
