Delivering on commitments

There is much more underway, but through these investments we have:

- ✔ Extended funding for 10 safety and community services providers and supported roles for the Tangentyere Council Women's Family Safety Group and Youth Safety Group.
- ✔ Improved safety through additional lights, fences around parks and car parks, and CCTV in the Alice Springs CBD and supported additional policing and liquor licencing inspectors.
- ✔ Improved First Nations health outcomes including through \$23.4 million to construct the Central Australian Aboriginal Congress Todd Street Health Hub that is well underway and expand the Central Australian Aboriginal Congress' Child and Youth Assessment and Treatment Service.
- ✔ Commenced building new and upgraded community and regional infrastructure, with 32 new remote community infrastructure projects announced, under construction or already completed.
- ✔ Provided \$40.4 million for On-Country learning at 44 Central Australia schools and supporting more than 190 new roles for teachers, assistant teachers, Aboriginal educators and family liaison staff helping young people get to school.
- ✔ Connecting First Nations communities in Central Australia to the Internet with new WIFI in 4 town camps and new projects in remote communities now being rolled out.
- ✔ Increased funding for school holidays activities and reviewed youth services across Central Australia to ensure future funds can be targeted at areas/communities need.
